Concept Maps


Concept maps are a top-down representation of concept which reflects your understanding of a topic.

Uses: clarify the relationships between different aspects of a topic, recording notes presenting ideas to others, organising ideas for an assignment, and studying for exams.

- 1. Name the concept at the top of the page.
- 2. Write down the aspects of the concept drawing lines to connect to the topic and other related aspects. Also write down words that describe the relationship.
