Referencing ChatGPT and Other Generative Artificial Intelligence (GenAI)

If your tutor has given permission for you to paraphrase or quote outputs from GenAI, such as from ChatGPT-3, you will need to apply APA referencing.

The <u>APA Style website</u> provides an example of how to do this (McAdoo, 2023). The following example shows the in-text citation and reference for a quote from ChatGPT-3:

When prompted with "Is the left brain right brain divide real or a metaphor?" the ChatGPT-generated text indicated that although the two brain hemispheres are somewhat specialized, "the notation that people can be characterized as 'left-brained' or 'right-brained' is considered to be an oversimplification and a popular myth" (OpenAl, 2023).

Remember that GenAI, although giving the impression of authorative and accurate information, is not an academic source, but is synthesised information from a variety of sources scraped from the internet. All sources suggested by GenAI should be checked, and you are advised to locate the sources and check each one using the <u>CRAAP</u> test to assess currency, relevance, authority, accuracy, and purpose.
