The EIT Master of Nursing programme will enhance your nursing knowledge, skills in critical analysis, constructive synthesis, along with advanced practice and research within your specialty area, particularly in preparation for advanced practice roles.

This qualification has been specifically designed to prepare nurses for the advanced practice role as a Nurse Practitioner and is approved by the Nursing Council of New Zealand as a “masters with a clinical focus, including the content for preparation for nurse prescribing”.

For nurses considering the Nurse Practitioner pathway, the Nursing Council of New Zealand requires that you complete specific courses.

Specialise your nursing knowledge

The Master of Nursing degree is a 240 credit (three to six years), applied clinically-focused programme characterised by advanced study in nursing.

You will develop advanced nursing knowledge, skills of critical analysis, constructive synthesis, advanced practice and research within your specialty area.

The Master of Nursing is awarded upon successful completion of four courses from the programme schedule plus MN9.490 Masterate Research Thesis, or MNSC9.001 Critical Inquiry for Nursing Practice and MNSC9.002 Research Project, followed by MN8.427 Advanced Practice for Nurse Practitioners.

For nurses intending to apply for Nurse Practitioner registration, the following courses must be included in the schedule of study:

- MN8.401 Advanced Clinical Assessment and Diagnostic Reasoning
- MN8.402 Advanced Pathophysiology for Health Professionals
- MN8.409 Pharmacotherapeutics for Advanced Nursing/ Midwifery Practice
- MN8.424 Registered Nurse Prescribing Practicum
- MN8.427 Advanced Practice for Nurse Practitioner

It is recognised that those undertaking this programme are often engaged in full-time clinical practice and study part-time.

Where there is a clinical practice component to the learning, you need to be employed in a clinical setting.

This programme is accredited by the Nursing Council of New Zealand for the Nurse Practitioner pathway.

We recommend that you take the opportunity to discuss your study options with the School of Nursing Postgraduate Programmes

Coordinator, prior to enrolment, to help ensure that you select the most appropriate pathway to meet your career goals.

Work-integrated Learning

Some courses will require you to be actively involved in clinical practice in the area of specialty.

Online / Blended Delivery

Our postgraduate courses are offered either online or with blended delivery. This means that the majority of the work is located on a virtual teaching and learning platform with directed activities and learning that you work through. Lecturers work within the virtual classroom setting so that they maintain contact with you.

Blended delivery means that there are contact sessions or workshops with the bulk of the learning activity undertaken in the online environment.

This flexible delivery method allows you to study at your pace, in your place, at locations throughout New Zealand.

Workload

Generally the courses are delivered online. However, some courses may require attendance at online sessions or face-to-face workshops. Any requirement for attendance at face-to-face sessions is identified in the course information.

Each credit for the course represents 10 hours of learning/study time over the period of the course.

You are expected to spend subsequent time in independent/self-directed study, critical reflection, and work-integrated learning in your place of study or work.

Additional Costs

- \$150 - \$200 approximately per course for textbooks (book lists will be available after enrolment)

Entry Requirements

An interview may be part of the application process where required or appropriate.

The academic entry requirement for the Master of Nursing is one of the following:

- Completion of the Postgraduate Diploma in Health Science (Registered Nurse Prescribing endorsement) with a B average or higher; or
- A postgraduate nursing qualification deemed equivalent to the Postgraduate Diploma in Health Science (Registered Nurse Prescribing endorsement) with a B average or higher.

Where the applicant's undergraduate degree does not provide the basis of study at the level required for more advanced study, enrolment in transitional or undergraduate courses may be required before the applicant can be admitted.

Special Conditions

Applicants must provide evidence of a current annual practising certificate with the Nursing Council of New Zealand.

For those considering the Nurse Practitioner pathway, please seek guidance from the Postgraduate Programmes Coordinator in regard to course choices before enrolling.

English Language Entry Requirements

Applicants from countries in which English is not the primary spoken language must demonstrate an acceptable level of English language fluency prior to acceptance in the programme. Ways in which English language fluency may be demonstrated include:

- Completion of a programme of study in which English was the language of instruction (conditions apply*); or
- Approved scores on IELTS tests, namely an Academic score of 7 for reading, listening and speaking and a minimum score of 6.5 for writing (or accepted international equivalents).

Entry with Credit

Applicants may be admitted with credit transfer or recognition of prior learning. The Postgraduate Programmes Cluster Committee has discretion in the granting of academic credit.

Academic credit may be awarded as specified credit where there is a substantial match between previous learning and the course for which academic credit is sought. Unspecified credits are not considered for this programme.

Credit granted shall not be for course(s) completed as part of an undergraduate degree, nor shall credit be granted that exceeds one-half of the total programme credits.

A Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)/entry with credit application pack is available on enrolment. It is recommended that applications for RPL/entry with credit are made as part of your initial application. Entry with credit cannot be processed until you are enrolled.

Assessments

Assessments are focused on the outcomes of the course and may include assignments, seminar presentations, journalling exercises, recorded exercises, exams and practical demonstration of skills.

MN8.401	<p>Advanced Clinical Assessment and Diagnostic Reasoning (Note: Current annual practising certificate required)</p> <p>This course begins with an overview of comprehensive health assessment and diagnostic reasoning within the context of advanced clinical practice.</p> <p>Students will critically appraise their own understanding of anatomy, physiology and pathophysiology required to develop advanced skills in interviewing, physical examination and diagnostic reasoning to identify knowledge deficits and learning needs. Skills, approaches and strategies for health assessment and diagnostic reasoning will be further enhanced. Students will be required to engage in significant independent learning and fieldwork. Students will undertake a range of activities to demonstrate advanced clinical assessment skills, critical thinking and the application of diagnostic reasoning strategies.</p> <p><i>Compulsory two-day contact sessions at Hawkes Bay campus.</i></p>	8	30	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MN8.402	<p>Advanced Pathophysiology for Health Professionals</p> <p>This course builds upon undergraduate study and the knowledge embedded in practice.</p> <p>The course will explore complex adult and child disease processes in order to support advanced diagnostic reasoning and therapeutic interventions for these client groups. This course assumes knowledge of normal physiological function and directs the student towards a progressive and more critical understanding of altered, complex health states.</p>	8	30	Online delivery
MN8.409	<p>Pharmacotherapeutics for Advanced Nursing / Midwifery Practice</p> <p>This course aims to allow the student to develop a conceptual understanding of pharmacology and therapeutics by building a foundation of knowledge of pharmacodynamics and pharmacokinetics. This knowledge will underpin critical analysis of the impact of life stages and disease states on drug therapy and will be complemented by an understanding of drug safety issues.</p>	8	30	Online delivery
MN8.424	<p>Registered Nurse Prescribing Practicum (Note: Current annual practising certificate required)</p> <p>This course represents the final praxis requirement for registered nurses (RN) who are seeking endorsement as a 'designated prescriber - registered nurse', with the Nursing Council of New Zealand. RNs are required to work with a nominated designated authorized prescriber (DAP) who will be their prescribing mentor, within a collaborative health care environment, for the duration of the course.</p>	8	30	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MN8.427	<p>Advanced Practice for Nurse Practitioner</p> <p>This course further develops the practitioner's advanced knowledge and skills within the individual's specialty area. With clinical and academic mentorship, practitioners will demonstrate competencies consistent with an advanced practitioner role: leadership; consultancy; involvement in local and national health and socio-economic policy; research; interdisciplinary collaboration; and expert and expanded clinical practice including advanced assessment, differential diagnosis, treatment and evaluation.</p>	8	60	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MNSC9.001	<p>Critical Inquiry for Nursing Practice</p> <p>The aim of this course is to build on students' existing knowledge and skills of scholarly enquiry, equipping them for research at an advanced level to inform their practice. Students will develop the skills required to critically appraise literature related to a specific research area. They will explore the philosophical and ethical underpinnings of different research paradigms. They will be supported to identify and formulate a research questions and the selection of an appropriate research methodology and design in preparation for their research project.</p>	9	30	Online delivery with compulsory block course

MNSC9.002	<p>Research Project</p> <p>The aim of this course is to provide the student with the guidance and support s/he requires to independently conduct a research study relevant to the discipline of nursing, as identified in MNSC9.001.</p> <p>The course is based on each student's individual research project, as agreed between the student and her/his supervisor. Each student will submit a written research report and present her/his research at a research forum.</p>	9	30	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MN9.490	<p>Masterate Research Thesis</p> <p>This course critically examines the philosophical, methodological and ethical issues that underpin research. The intent is to establish a sound foundation for the student's developing knowledge and understanding of the nature and application of research. The aim will be to support the student in identifying and formulating research questions and, the selection of appropriate research methodology and design in preparation for Masterate Thesis research.</p> <p>A range of current research methods will be explored in terms of the design, data collection and relevant analytic issues. This will include construction and use of measurement tools and the collection, analysis and interpretation of quantitative data and qualitative research approaches to study human phenomena.</p> <p>The student is required to carry out a piece of scholarly work which demonstrates a high degree of skill in data collection, analysis, critical evaluation and effective oral and written communication (NZQA, 2000, p23).</p>	9	90	Online delivery with compulsory block course



How to Enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on 0800 22 55 348 and we will send you one.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details.

Fees Free Government Scheme: Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to FeesFree.govt.nz and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and Grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. We urge you to enrol as soon as possible, but no later than:

- **Monday, 19 January 2026** for 2026 full year or first semester courses

and

- **Monday, 22 June 2026** for 2026 second semester courses.

The majority of courses are offered in an online delivery mode, meaning there will be no requirement for you to physically attend classes. Other courses are available through flexible (blended/online) delivery, meaning that some of the courses do require you to attend workshops. Unless specified, face-to-face classes are held at the EIT Hawke's Bay campus in Taradale, and the rest of your learning is carried out online. You will be notified of dates and venues prior to the commencement of your course.

Please note, for your study purposes, each 30 credit course requires 56 contact hours (i.e. equivalent to eight study days of release time). Registered nurse applicants are strongly advised to refer to their local Health NZ / Te Whatu Ora Postgraduate Funding Coordinator, should they require information about Health Workforce postgraduate nursing education funding.

If you're new to online study, you'll have access to recorded orientation videos to help you get started. For personalised support, you're welcome to contact our Information and Learning Technologies Librarian, who can assist you with any questions or technical issues.

Please refer to the previous page for enrolment close-off dates.

Applying for academic credit: There is a separate application for this.

New students: It may be possible for us to consider credit of previous formal postgraduate study from another institution, or some recognition of prior learning. Please request an application pack from us.

EIT returning students: If you have previously completed a postgraduate health science qualification at EIT and are progressing onto further study after a period of five years or more, you may wish to apply for credit. We recommend that you do this at time of enrolment into the new programme. Please request an application pack from us.

Existing EIT students who have progressed onto further study after a break of fewer than five years are not required to apply.
